Profiling CNIA Board Members

How did you start your career in nursing? What first drew you to informatics?

My clinical career was primarily related to children and families, I spent a number of years working general duty on a pediatric unit before pursuing my neonatal speciality as the site opened its first NICU. I was one of the first clinical resources nurses overseeing both the NICU and the pediatric unit. As we moved into a new building, I had to decide where I would continue my career and chose the pediatric unit as their clinical nurse educator. At the time we were part of a health region with four sites that was being made into a health authority of 12 sites and decisions were coming about how we would align our systems. Our site leader asked me to join a weekly meeting of people who would be implementing the new core clinical information system and represent our sites' interests. She told me since I liked computers, I would be a good fit, and this was in 2002.

What was your first role in informatics?

After a year of learning new acronyms, all about design, system configuration, naming standards etc. I was asked to be part of the implementation and accepted a role as a Clinical Information Specialist. I was part of the group that designed, built, tested, validated, trained, implemented, and evaluated the new system. I stayed through the first three golives before returning to my previous role, but within weeks knew it was no longer a good fit for me. I was lucky the person who first hired me in Informatics was keen to have me back and not only had a CIS role for me, but saw in me a future informatics leader and supported me in moving into various roles in the department. My last role with them as a Director overseeing all of our community, primary care, public health systems and non-core acute systems.

What is your current role and what is the focus of the role?

Today I am the Chief Clinical Information Officer at Fraser Health Authority in BC, in the role for a little over two years and strangely enough have gone back to the beginning, focused on implementing the newest version of our core clinical information system and leveraging it to extend our HIMSS footprint. As a large health authority, we take pride in having a single standardized CIS, but that adds a layer of challenge when making the magnitude of change that we foresee and we are having to be very deliberate in how we move forward. The impact of COVID-19 on our front line clinicians and providers cannot be forgotten and when thinking about a transformative change such as we are planning, we need to recognize and acknowledge where they are at and then be creative to ensure that there is opportunity for them to be engaged around the change and have the opportunity to contribute.

What key messages do you have for nurses interested in working in the informatics field?

Informatics is a dynamic field, constantly evolving and there is no better example than the last 18 months where virtual care has grown by leaps and bounds; and our patient, client, resident and family expectations of it and us have grown as well. The opportunities we have to support nurses' use of technology related to clinical standardization, nursing sensitive outcomes, presenting information to our nurses in a way that focuses on improving quality of care and patient outcomes as well as the clinician and provider experience is remarkable and key to why I chose this field almost 20 years ago.
